- Pursues our vision through direct services, education, advocacy, and outreach, in conjunction with our partners, to directly benefit these communities;

- Works with the Foundation of the NCSF (FNCSF) as an educational clearinghouse that offers workshops for individuals, groups and businesses on protecting their rights to sexual freedom.

NCSF takes the lead in defending the rights of individuals and groups in the BDSM, swing and polyamory communities with our ongoing projects:

Incident Response – Assisting individuals, groups, businesses, attorneys and local officials with child custody and divorce, club/business formations, harassment and domestic violence assistance, potential criminal cases, employment discrimination, and media issues.

Kink-Aware Professionals Referral List – A free referral list of psychotherapeutic, medical, and legal professionals who are kink aware and kink friendly.

Consent Counts – Working to decriminalize consensual BDSM, create a database of relevant state laws, and to provide education on the current court decisions and consent in a BDSM context.

Media Outreach Project – To counteract negative stereotypes of alternative sexuality in the mainstream media, NCSF offers media training, interviews for a wide range of media outlets, and Media Updates about alternative sexuality in the news.

Educational Outreach Project – Educational workshops on relevant legal, medical and other issues relating to alternative sexuality for individuals, groups and businesses.

Legal Actions – NCSF contributes amicus briefs for relevant legal cases involving free speech, “consent is not a defense to assault,” and obscenity regulations which unconstitutionally restrict the materials that consenting adults can view or read.

what is alternative sexuality?

Millions of consenting adults engage in BDSM, swing and polyamory activities. Many experience discrimination and persecution due to negative stereotypes that are encouraged by the media and religious political extremists. NCSF’s Violence & Discrimination Survey found that 30% of the respondents experienced discrimination, while 36% suffered violence or harassment.

BDSM: Behaviors involving the consensual exchange of power, intense erotic stimulation and/or mental and emotional discipline to produce sexual arousal and satisfaction. Five to ten percent of the adult population in America engages in BDSM on at least an occasional basis.*

Swinging: Social and sexual interaction with someone other than your significant other, with each couple honestly defining the limits of their activities for themselves. Two percent of adults in America have tried swinging, which is also known as The Lifestyle.*

Polyamory: Intimate relationships in which consenting adults explore love and sex outside of traditional monogamy, often forming multiple committed relationships with the consent of all partners. According to one study, 28% of the respondents had “an understanding that allows nonmonogamy under some circumstances.” **
